




Fullerman (my fifth year teacher) makes the whole class stand outside our room. He says,


"Welcome BACK, Class 5F. I've got a BIG surprise for you ALL."

(Which is not good news.)


He's rearranged ALL the desks! I'm now sitting right at the front of the class. Worse still, Marcus "Moany" Meldrew is next to me.







But the camping shop had some cool stuff, and Dad got carried away. He spent a $100\,\mathrm{T}$ of money and made me promise not to tell Mom.


"We could have stayed in a nice hotel; it would have been cheaper," Dad said.

"Look on the bright side," Derek says.







My trick worked a TREAT.

I had just finished writing my homework review when I accidentally spilled the BIGGEST glass of water all over it.


I am very upset, as it was a VERY good review.

Oh dear, Tom!


What a mess. I will look forward to seeing it redone for tomorrow. Watch out for those BIG pesky glasses of water in the future!

OK, Mrs. Worthington, I'll do my best.



(Oh, dear.... That's not really (very good news. Let me explain...)




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
Granny Mavis and Granddad Bob are not your usual kind of grandparents.

t makes me late for school again (worth it, though). So I don't bother brushing my hair and just grab my clothes off the floor to wear (they're crumpled ... but who cares).


Then I stuff as much toast in my mouth as possible and take an apple to eat on the way (which is not easy on a bike).

"Oh, dear. You've got something NASTY stuck between your teeth."






Marcus is straining his head and trying to look over my shoulder so he can see \bigcirc \bigcirc what I'm doing.

"Sssshhhhhhh."


Mr. Fullerman is giving me the beady eye now.
