Like I’m watching myself go through the motions because I’m trying to make sense of what the hell I’m doing. Why I’m going back. “Is everything in order at the house?”

“Yes, sir. Ready for your arrival.”

I give her a wide, toothy grin. “I’m clean.”

“I’d rather be certain.”

“You’re going to be fun.”

Her shoulders slump as she leans back in her seat and watches traffic crawl by.

I turn my attention to the road too, my mind busy. Hugo arranged for a cleaning crew to get the house ready for us early this morning. It’ll take more than a few hours to clean all the rooms though. So much has been shut up. Helen, who worked for my father and then my uncle, will travel to the house later today as well. I know she’s gone back to the place since that night. Someone had to make sure of the upkeep. farther out as I approach Rockcliffe House. Cilla is sitting up, really paying attention now. I wonder if she's memorizing the road. Maybe thinking she'll have a chance to run. She won't. I'll make that clear when we reach Rockcliffe House.

The tall iron gates finally come into view. They're supported on either side by a large, stone pillar which becomes a six-foot high perimeter surrounding the property. Each of the pillars is topped with a watching gargoyle. And they are truly watching. Cameras are embedded within each one.

I slow the SUV and turn onto the path leading to those foreboding gates.

I clear my throat and steel myself before turning to Cilla.

She draws back. “This isn’t a house. I guess I have no idea how much money thugs make these days.”

I could take offense, but honestly, I need her distraction right now, so I chuckle.

We stay like that for a long minute, and I’m pretty sure she only breathes when I release her. We turn to the front doors that are pushed open, two men standing at attention just inside.

“Boys.” I nod in greeting, my tone casual although the old, closed up smell of the house still carries something familiar in it. My cell phone vibrates in my pocket. I fish it out. It’s Hugo. I silence it, but need to call him back.

Cilla’s looking around, her eyes like saucers. The formal living room and the dining room, both of which we can see standing in the foyer, have been thoroughly cleaned, and I remember how my mother had wanted to

replace the carpet in the dining room where a spill stained it. She never got the chance though.

I turn my gaze to the curving staircase, wide and opulent, the steps white marble veined with black to match the foyer.

“Is the blue bedroom prepared?” I ask.

“Yes, sir.”

“Please take my guest to it. Assign a man to her room in case she needs anything or feels the need to go wandering about.”

She gives me a glare but her curiosity has her following the man up. I head to my father’s study, blocking the memories from my mind. I don’t have time to deal with them just yet. I’ll work now. Give myself until tonight. Then I’ll go out back. Out to the barn. The greenhouse my mom had such hopes for. Then I’ll stand inside and let myself remember.

I walk into the blue bedroom and don't turn around when the door closes behind me. I have too much on my mind and I know the man will stand guard outside. I know I won't be allowed out until Kill comes for me. But for right now, that's okay. I need to process what's happened. Who I'm dealing with. Because I've just realized who he is.

I go to one of the three windows lining the walls and push it open. My room overlooks the back of the property. I know the layout of the house. I've studied the design. Was obsessed with it for a time.

I leave the window open even though it's cold out because the room has a smell to it. The whole house does. It's like the stain of the past. Of secrets being locked away for too long. It's stale and decrepit even though the mansion is in excellent condition. I try to imagine what it must cost to maintain it. Wonder how often Kill comes here. It's a hell of a weekend getaway.

Keeping my coat on, I let fresh, cold air into the bedroom and look around. The Persian carpet is slightly worn but in good condition, and pretty. A light blue with elaborate, beautiful patterns along the four corners. I go to the bed, pull back the duvet, and sit. It's much more comfortable than I expect it to be, but the mattress is new, even though I can tell the bed

is an antique. It has four posts and a canopy over the head. I smell the comforter, the pillow. They don't smell like the room. These are new.

I open the single drawer in the nightstand and a pencil rolls forward. It's kind of creepy, the sound. I pick it up. It's only about three inches long and the eraser has been chewed on. I wonder about the person who did that. If it was her. Kill's sister, Virginia. Ginny for short. I put it back and close it.

There are two doors and I open the first one to find a bathroom. It's large and luxurious, although the fixtures are old. Fresh towels are stacked on a shelf with bottles of shampoo, conditioner, soap, and anything I could ask for, really. I recognize the brands too. Nothing I can usually afford to buy.

Back in the bedroom, I open the other door and a light goes on. It's a large walk-in closet. And it's stocked. Hanging on a rack are too many dresses for me to count. Shoes are lined neatly on shelves along another wall and the drawers are filled with jeans, sweaters, shirts, belts, underthings. I check the labels. Look at the tags. Everything is new and everything is my size.

I step back, confused. There are more clothes here than in my closet at home.

Back in the bedroom, I pull my coat tight around me as a gust of cold wind blows in rain and a few yellowed leaves from the tree outside. I go to it, let my face get wet as I survey the property. It's vast, although needs maintaining. Everything is overgrown and melds into the thick cropping of trees at the far end. The pool is unprotected. The tarp is torn and weather-worn. Leaves lie inside, rotting in stagnant rain water. The abandoned feel of the place gives me a chill and I draw the window closed. I lean my back against the wall, hugging my arms to myself.

I wonder why he brought me here.

It's all coming together now. Who he is. What this place is.

About two years ago, I'd done a story on haunted mansions in the northeast for a Halloween ghost story. Rockcliffe had become the headliner of my piece with not one ghost but two.

Earlier, when the doctor had called Kill by his last name, it wasn't that I recognized it, but it had jogged something in my brain. Kill. Mr. Killian. Mr. Black. Kill is Killian Black. His family is notorious. His father and uncle were both criminals with ties to the mafia. Killian now runs Mea Culpa, a high end gentlemen's club, essentially a strip club for the elite, which I was sure was used as a front to launder money. That's where I must have been yesterday, where they'd taken Jones and me. That would explain the music. And why no one cared that I was being led out so obviously against my will.

The only photographs I had ever seen of Kill when I'd found the house and my interest had been piqued had been taken when he wasn't quite eighteen. The way he looked then versus the way he looks now, you wouldn't say it was the same person.

Although, the piece I wrote was essentially fiction but for a handful of facts, when I'd been researching Rockcliffe House, I learned about the Black family's tragic history. Kill's uncle's death, like so many things, got lost in the weeks following as other news stories took over the headlines. And no matter how much I dug, I couldn't find anything more about the story and I knew there was a cover-up.

And now I stand wondering why in hell he's brought me here.

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Day turns into night before I hear his voice in the hallway. Kill walks inside and looks around the room. I wish I'd had time to put on the boots because I'm two inches shorter without them and I need the height with him. Seeming satisfied with the room, he looks me over.

"I could have told you it would."

He glances up at the canopy over the bed before returning his gaze to me. "Are you comfortable?"

"Is this where I'll be locked up for the next thirty days?" I don't know why I'm being combative. It's like I can't control the words as they come



hurtling out.

He steps closer, a devilish grin playing on his lips, and takes my arms, rubbing them up and down—he's holding back, I can tell—before closing his hands over them. "There are less hospitable rooms."

"I'm sure there are."

"You're ungrateful."

"I know who you are."

He studies my face, searches my eyes. I don't know what I expect him to say, not sure he realizes I mean I know what he did. Not when he doesn't acknowledge my comment.

"Dinner's ready. We'll talk about rules and expectations after we eat. You're hungry, I presume." Someone had come up with food earlier but I'd turned it away out of pure stubbornness and regretted it later because they hadn't asked me twice.

I nod, because the growling of my stomach tells him yes, I'm starving.

He walks into the closet and returns a moment later with a dress. It's a calf-length pale violet dress with spaghetti straps. He tosses it on the bed along with a pair of strappy sandals.

"Change."

I look at it, then at him. "It's cold for that, don't—"

"Change."

I exhale, and pick up the dress, making a point of checking the size, turning my nose up at it even though it's beautiful. "Can I have some privacy?" I ask finally.

"No."

My jaw tightens.

"This can go like last night went, but if that happens, it'll be me stripping you and taking you downstairs to eat naked in front of the staff."

I swallow. His tone is just this side of controlled. My hands shake as I pull my sweater over my head, then push my jeans off. I take the dress off

the hanger and go to slip it on but he stops me.

“Nothing underneath.”

I look up at him, then down, closing my eyes for a moment before reaching back to undo my bra. He watches silently as I take it off. I then slide off my panties, everything feeling like *déjà vu*. It’s humbling, this re-enactment of the night before. I pull the dress over my head. The silk is cool against my skin, and my nipples push against the fine material. It comes to just past my knees and is a perfect fit. I sit on the bed to slip on the sandals. He watches me quietly and when I stand, he looks me over, gives me a nod and gestures to the door.

“Let’s go,” he says.

I walk ahead of him out into the now abandoned hallway, acutely aware of his eyes on me, a fine layer of silk the only thing protecting me from his gaze. For now. We go down the stairs. As we near the lush dining room, the smell of dinner makes my stomach groan again. If he hears, he doesn’t say anything.

The dining room table is a rectangle that can seat about sixteen. Two places are set, and when we reach them, Kill pulls out my chair. I sit and watch as he takes his place at the head of the table. The large crystal chandelier blinks once. We both glance up at it.

It’s strange to look at him now. He seems so civilized, so different from the man I met just yesterday. The man who had my brother and I kidnapped, who threatened to break his legs. A man who deals in drugs and sex. Who makes trades that save one man’s legs from being broken in exchange for the ownership of another’s body.

“What are you thinking?”

I shake my head, realize I’ve been staring at him. “Nothing.”

He takes the open bottle of red and pours us each a generous glass.

The kitchen door opens and Helen, the woman I’d met earlier in Kill’s penthouse, enters, followed by two young girls in uniforms. One is carrying

a large, closed serving dish from which wafts the most delicious smell of beef and spices. The second girl has a plate of roasted vegetables. Helen directs them to set the dishes down and removes the lid from the main dish.

“Mmm, my favorite, Helen.” Kill closes his eyes as he savors the scent.

Helen smiles and I know she’s been with him for a long time. She knows him. And he seems to trust her. “I figured homecoming required a special meal. Girls.” The two girls begin to serve us. They fill Kill’s plate first, then mine, and I can’t help but appreciate the exotic scent wafting up from my dish.

Once they’ve served us, they leave us alone. Kill takes his napkin and places it on his lap. He glances at me over a forkful of food. “Eat.”

I follow his lead and take my first bite and oh my goodness. It’s heaven. The meat melts on my tongue, the flavors exploding, tasting like nothing I’ve eaten before.

“Helen is an amazing cook. She’s been with my family for years.”

“Are we going to make small talk?” I ask. “I mean, let’s be straightforward about the fact that I’m here against my will. This isn’t exactly a date.”

“Oh, I wouldn’t be anything but straightforward. But I like to take care of my things. Don’t want them breaking down. Passing out. Fading away with hunger. What would be the point?”

I set my fork down. I’ve lost my appetite. His reminder is blunt, cutting.

He sips his wine and takes another bite. “Don’t pout, Cilla. It’s not becoming.”

“What do you want with me? You can have anyone you want. You have a strip club full of women I’m sure would love to be here in my place right now. What do you want with me?”

He tilts his head to the side as he chews another forkful. I realize I’ve given something away. I shouldn’t know about Mea Culpa. I’m sure that’s

where I was when I was blindfolded, but I shouldn't know it. And from the look on his face, he didn't miss my slip.

I clear my throat and force a potato into my mouth.

"We made a deal. I want what you promised. And in return, I'll keep my promise. That's all."

"There's a closet full of clothes upstairs."

"If you prefer to walk around the house naked, that's certainly—"

"I know who you are," I blurt out, wanting a reaction. "I know what you did."

He considers me, his eyes clouding, darkening. Like they did last night before he attacked me. I wring the napkin in my hands and push my chair back a little, readying to run. But where? Where would I run to?

Kill takes the last bite of food, cleaning his plate, then wipes his mouth and sets his napkin on the table. He rises and looks down at me.

"Punish me how?"

One side of his mouth curves upward. "I'll show you. I'm sure an opportunity will present itself soon."

I don't want him to see how his warning impacts me, but I know he sees my shudder.

"You'll be allowed outside twice a day with supervision."

I open my mouth to remark on that, but close it again. I'm not sure I want to learn about his punishments just yet.

"Questions so far?"

"Will I be here for the full month?"

"I haven't decided."

"You said I'd be able to work. I need my laptop to do that."

"Once you earn it, you'll have it."

"But you said—"

"Thirty days. Our agreement. It was your idea, remember. You're mine for the next thirty days." There's a pause while he drinks, his eyes watching me all along. "I don't want you wandering around the house alone. Bedroom, library and kitchen only. Clear?"

"Clear." I say what he wants to hear.

"Good. Finish your drink."

As if to set the example, he drains his glass. I know what's coming after this. And I know there's no way to get out of it. My heart is racing and goosebumps make the hair on my arms stand on end. I finish my drink and set it down on the side table beside me.

"Come here, Cilla."

I just look at him for the longest time. My insides are churning. I have a thousand questions and none that matter. Because what's left for me to ask?

I am his whore.

It's what I offered. What it cost to save my brother. Maybe after this, I'll be finished owing Jones, but I know that's not true. I'll never be finished. So I do as Kill says. I rise to my feet and go to him.

"Closer," he whispers.

I move one more inch. The toes of my sandals are touching his shoes, my nipples brushing his chest. I have to crane my neck to look up at him.

"I won't ever want you, you know," I start. "I won't ever give it. Know that you'll have to take it every time."

He cocks his head to the side, his gaze unreadable, intense. "Maybe I like taking, Cilla."

“Why did you come here? Why did you agree?”

Any momentary tenderness is replaced by dominance. By ownership. I lock eyes with him again, but this time, it’s like predator and prey. And I am firmly cornered. Caught.

“You want this, Cilla. You want this exactly like this.”



“I don’t.”

He walks me backward until my back hits the wall. That’s when he releases my sex, grabbing my hips instead, raising me up, fingers digging into me. I know he’s right. That I’m wet. He keeps me there with one hand while with the other, he undoes his belt, his pants, pushes them down. I look at his cock. It’s thick and big. “The boy needs to learn a lesson, Kill.”

“Let me handle it. If he pulls shit like this again, I’ll teach it to him.” And I will. Better to get his ass kicked by me than have his knee caps blown out by Dominic Benedetti.

“You know I respect you,” he says. I know there’s more so I don’t speak. “But if you don’t teach it, I will.”

“Understood.” Benji’s safe, for now. “How’s Gia?” I ask, changing the subject. “How many months along is she now?” I know exactly how far Gia Benedetti, Dominic’s wife, is. And I know they struggled to get pregnant for two years so he’s handling her with kid gloves.

“Five months and two weeks. It’s a boy.”

I hear the pride in his tone. And even though I know this isn’t his first kid, I pretend like it is. “Congratulations. Pass that on to Gia, will you?”

“I will. Let me know when you talk to Ben.”

“Will do.”

After we hang up, I finish my coffee and get up. It’s early, but I head to the club. I need to bury myself in work today. I need to do it to forget. I leave word with Helen that one of the boys should drive Cilla to the club tonight.

A knock on my door rouses me from sleep. I sit up and rub my eyes, confused for a moment. Memories of the night before come flooding back. The knock comes again and I know it can't be Kill. He wouldn't knock.

"Cilla?" It's Helen.

"Come in." I glance at the clock. It's noon.

She opens the door and looks at me. She's carrying a tray of coffee and some food that she sets down. "Are you not feeling well?"

No, not really, but not in the way she thinks. "Just a little stomach ache," I lie.

"Do you want me to open the curtains?"

"No, thanks. I'll just sleep a little while." I don't want to run into Kill so I plan on hiding out in here as long as possible.

"I brought some toast," she starts.

"Thank you. Maybe later. Um...is Kill here?" I heard a car earlier and I'm hoping it was him leaving.

"No, he went to work. He said he'd send a driver to pick you up at nine o'clock this evening to take you into the city. You'll have dinner at the club."

"Why?"



“I don’t know, dear.”

“So he’ll be gone all day?”

“Yes.”

“Helen, can I ask you a question?”

“Of course.”

“How often does he come here? To the house I mean? Does he spend weekends here or...” I trail off because I have a suspicion.

She looks straight at me. “It’s his first time since his sister’s death.” I’m surprised at her honesty. And I guessed right.

“What time do I need to be ready to go?” I remember what she said, I’m just thinking.

“Nine o’clock.”

“Okay. I’ll just sleep a little longer and I’ll be down later.”

“All right.” She pauses, sighs before she speaks. “He’s not a bad person. He just comes off...”

“Like one.”

She sucks in her lips. “I’ll check in on you later,” she says.

“No, I’m a light sleeper so probably best not to.”

She studies me for a minute, then nods, turns and leaves. I wait until I hear her go downstairs before I throw the covers back and get up.

I have a feeling I know where Kill was last night. There’s only one place he could have gone to. He’d been shaken up. Drunk too, but it wasn’t that. He’d mentioned ghosts. Twice. Said they were angry.

I go into the closet and get dressed, choosing a pair of jeans, a sweater and flat boots. It’s raining again, I can hear it on the window, so I anticipate mud.

I know what I’m going to do is wrong, but he didn’t leave me a choice last night. It’s like every time he touches me, he strips me bare. He reads me, sees me in a way I don’t like being seen.

He knows I'm damaged. But he doesn't know why, because even if he digs, there's nothing to be found. No files, no charges, no accusations. Judge Callahan, the man who took Jones and I in, made sure of that. Just like he made sure neither of us would talk by promising my freedom when Jones turned eighteen if he kept his end of the bargain. A devil's bargain.

"A different sort of devil than Kill." I mutter the words aloud but I realize it's not true. Kill isn't like the judge. Not even close, even considering everything.

But that doesn't matter. I need to have leverage, something I can use to lay Kill bare, like he does me. I need to break him before he breaks me because what he said is true. He is greedy. And I know exactly what that something is.

Finding a raincoat, I slip it on and step out into the hallway. I noticed last night that the sliding glass door Kill came inside through doesn't use a key to lock it. Not from the inside at least. I creep down the stairs, keeping an eye out for Helen, but the coast is clear and I move quickly through the living room and to the glass doors. They're not even locked and I slide one open, step out, then close it behind me. A cold, fall wind gives me a chill as I glance around. It's creepy here, with the leaves of the half bare trees rotting on the damp earth, the furniture covered over, and the torn tarp over the pool constantly, unceasingly whipped by the wind. I hug my arms to myself, rub them for warmth, then sprint as quickly as I can into the woods. If I remember correctly, the barn is at the farthest point and it's an almost straight shot.

It's colder beneath the trees. The sun can't penetrate this dense forest. The ground is thick with mud and I think of him last night, trudging through

this in socks. Was he even thinking? Was it a conscious decision? Or was he too drunk to think clearly? Too shaken up after seeing the place where she hanged herself. Because I know that's where he went.

Why had she done it? And how was it linked to the uncle's murder? I know it has to be. Too coincidental otherwise and if there's one thing I don't believe in, it's coincidence.

It takes me much longer than I expect to get to the barn because of the ground being so wet, but also because the property is much larger than it seemed on paper. Because I know she would have been afraid. Terrified.

What could lead a fifteen-year-old girl to hang herself? The papers never said, but she was a minor. That wasn't strange. Of course given what happened with the uncle, there was speculation. Some papers even painted Kill as the monster who pushed her to it. I don't believe that though. I just don't.

A noise behind me has me let out a small scream and I jump. A metal something crashing to the ground. But when I turn, there's no one there. Kill's not behind me. Neither is Helen. A ghost, maybe.

A moment later, a mouse scurries under the barn door, exiting this haunted place.

"Just a mouse, Cilla. Just a tiny, little mouse."

But my heart doesn't stop racing as I turn back to survey the space.

I look down. Mud does mark the places he was in here. And he was wearing his shoes from the look of the prints. I follow them deeper into darkness until I see it. See why he had no shoes on when he came back to the house. See the chair standing upright against one wall. It's been cleaned off because it's the only thing here that's not covered in a thick layer of

dust. And what's underneath it—oh God—it's one of the saddest things I've ever seen.

I walk to it. To his shoes now caked in dried mud standing neatly against the wall. Between them a smaller shoe. A ballet flat.

With a shudder, I stare at it, noticing as I near it how the color has faded to palest pink. There's a smudge of the magenta it once was along the side. It's small, maybe a size six or seven at most. And between his giant ones, it looks like a young child's shoe.

I know it's Ginny's. And I know why it's here. There's only one reason. She must have had them on when she did it, and one must have slipped off or the cleaners somehow missed this second shoe.

I wonder how long he was here last night. What he did. I imagine what he feels or felt. I know how Jones was when it was me. I know what extent he went to in order to protect me. And I know how I feel every day when I realize over and over again that I couldn't protect him.

I wonder if that's Kill's hell. If that's his demon. The knowledge that he could not protect his baby sister. Because at least my brother is alive.

Lightning strikes in the distance, animating me. I turn and walk to the barn door, in a hurry to leave. To get out of this place where the past lingers. This space that ghosts haunt. It's a heavy place, like for the last few years air hasn't penetrated and everything has grown stale and weighted. When I set foot outside, I run. I run back to the house, suddenly feeling like I'm being chased, needing to go back to the land of the living.

This was wrong. I shouldn't have gone to the barn. Those warning voices were right. I had no business there. But it's too late now. I've seen it and you can't unsee what you've seen. It's not how things work. I know. My God, do I know.

I'm crying by the time I walk up the steps toward the pool and when I spy movement behind the glass doors, I don't try to hide. I'll take my medicine. And I do feel sick now, sick to my stomach.

I push the glass doors open and step inside, take off my mud-covered boots, and carry them up to my room. If Helen has seen me, she doesn't say a word, but in my room, I find the tray she'd left is gone, replaced by another with still warm tea and crackers. I strip off my wet clothes and climb back into the bed and close my eyes and when I sleep, all I can see are those shoes. Three of them. Lined up against the wall. A hangman's rope beside them, lying in a pool of blood and urine, a stained kitchen knife at its center.

I sit at a table in the restaurant of the club with a whiskey in front of me looking out on the floor. The restaurant part, which is small, is slightly elevated from the main floor where patrons can watch what's going on while having a meal.

This afternoon, I paid a visit to Cilla's brother. What happened last night has been bugging me all day. When I told her she was damaged she didn't deny it. She just looked at me like it was a fact, simple and straight. And I want to know what the damage is.

But Jones surprised me. When it came to talking about her, talking about their time in foster care, he was like a different person. He put up walls so thick and so high, they were impenetrable, even for me. Whatever happened to Cilla when she was a kid, he's not talking.

And something did happen.

That sounds way too fucking coincidental and I don't buy it. I don't even know if he wants me to.

But why in hell would he defend Judge Callahan if the old man abused her? Especially now that they're both adults and he can't touch them.

If that wasn't enough, I had a call from Helen informing me Cilla had snuck out of the house and when she'd returned she'd been soaked and covered in mud. It doesn't take a genius to know where she went.

When Hugo walks onto the main floor, I check my watch. It's almost ten o'clock. Cilla will be here soon. I want to know if he's learned anything.

The waitress walks over as Hugo takes a seat across from me.

"Usual?" she asks him.

"Yeah." He sets a file down on the table and slides it over to me. The look on his face tells me it's not good.

I open it, glance at the sheets inside, waiting while the waitress delivers Hugo's drink.

"A dirty judge," I say. I expected that.

"The dirtiest kind." He reaches over and flips a few pages back. "These are the kids he took in. Always teens. Always a pair—brother and sister. Always an older brother, younger sister."

Hugo grins, swallows his whiskey. “I’ll leave first thing tomorrow morning.”

“Thank you.”

The front door opens then and John, the man I sent to bring Cilla, walks in. I feel Hugo’s eyes on me when I stand and button my jacket as Cilla enters a moment later.

I clear my throat.

He clucks his tongue and gets to his feet. “I’ll talk to you later, boss,” Hugo says.

I don’t take my eyes off her. “Later.” She’s still got her coat on so I can’t see what she’s wearing, but she’s got on a pair of high-heeled black pumps. When John puts a hand at her back to guide her to the restaurant, she brushes it off. She spots me in the same instant and stops when our eyes meet. I wonder if it’s guilt. She resumes walking. The eyes of other diners follow her when she climbs the two stairs to the restaurant and approaches me.

“Cilla,” I say, drawing out her chair.

“Killian.”

She doesn’t like calling me Kill. “Take off your coat.”

She looks down as if just realizing she still has it on. Unbuttoning it, she slips it off her shoulders. I take it and hand it to John. “Thank you, John.”

“Sir.”

He turns to walk away and I look Cilla over. She’s wearing a strappy black dress that clings to her. The hem comes to mid-thigh and she looks stunning. I nod in approval and gesture for her to sit. She does and her gaze moves across the room and while it does, I take her in. She’s left her hair loose and it drapes thick and dark down her back. Her heavy bangs frame her pretty eyes as she watches the dancers, three of them on three different stages. It’s a classy place, one for the wealthiest of the wealthy, but ultimately it’s a strip club. And she’s not impressed.

I grin. “Not good enough for you?”

“It’s not your little adventure that worked up an appetite, is it?” I ask, wanting her to know that I know.

She flushes, blinks rapidly and looks around the room. “Where’s the bathroom?” she asks, rising.

I nod in the direction of the lady’s room. Her heels click as she walks away and I scan the patrons of the restaurant, making note of who’s

watching her, who's with whom, memorizing alliances. These are dangerous men. This is a dangerous world. And when Cilla returns to the table, I wonder for a moment why I've brought her here. In public. Because I know each of these men is, in turn, watching me. Taking inventory of what's mine.

We don't speak, but drink the wine instead. She's clearly anxious under my gaze, but I don't mind that. I like it, in fact.

When the waitress brings dinner, Cilla eats with gusto. I make a mental note to tell Helen to feed her regularly whether she asks for meals or not.

"What were you looking for?" I ask her.

She doesn't pretend to not know what I'm talking about and I respect her for that. She puts her fork down, chewing on a piece of meat as she considers her answer. "I wanted to know where you went," she finally says after swallowing.

"But you knew where I went."

She stares at me, uncertain what I mean, but perhaps suspecting.

"You wrote a piece on Rockcliffe House two years ago. You didn't use your full name when you published. You used Hawk instead. Why?"

She clearly didn't know I knew this, but I look into the background of every person I come in contact with. It's just I didn't expect to find what I did on her.

"That was a fluff piece. A ghost story. I want to be a serious writer."

"So you were looking for my sister's ghost out there?"

She chokes on the bite she just put into her mouth and gulps half her glass of water to wash it down.

"I don't like wasting words, Cilla. I already told you that."

"I wanted to know why you'd come back like you had last night. Barefoot but for your socks. It was strange. And you were drunk. I thought you were, at least."

"I was when I went out there."

“What happened to your face?” she asks. “The scar?”

I know what she’s talking about. I pick up the bottle and refill her glass, then take a sip of mine, set my glass down and lean back in my chair before answering.

“That’s the cut my uncle got in before I stuck a knife in his gut.”

Her mouth falls open and her eyes go wide.

I grin. “It was a long time ago and he deserved it. Why do you look shocked? You know this already. It’s not a secret. Everyone in this place knows what I did.”

“Why did you get out of prison after only four years?”

“I served my time.”

“No, you didn’t. You only served four years.”

I lean forward, pick up my last forkful of meat and stick it into my mouth, crushing the tender flesh between my teeth.

“My uncle deserved to die. I wasn’t the only one who thought so.” I wipe my mouth and set my napkin on my plate.

Cilla slumps back in her chair, picks up her glass and drinks the last of it. I signal to the waitress. “Get us another bottle.”

“Yes, sir.”

“What did he do?” Cilla asks, like she’s barely realized the waitress was just here.

I study her for a very long time before replying with less emotion than I thought I could. “He’d been raping my sister for a long time. She was fifteen when she died.”

Cilla’s face goes white. That detail she didn’t know. Not many people do. I don’t know why I just told her.

I unclench my fist and rub my hand across my mouth.

Cilla is thoughtful for a long time. I don’t anticipate her next question. I think it’s going to be something else. Some words of pity. But she surprises

me. She always seems to surprise me. “What does it feel like?” She’s watching me so intently, I don’t think she’s blinking.

“What does what feel like?”

The look in her eyes, it’s strange. Dark. Too dark for her.

The waitress comes to replace our empty bottle. I pour for us both and Cilla waits to speak until I’m sitting back again.

“Stabbing a man.”

Our eyes are locked and I don’t understand what I’m seeing. She’s trembling a little, and her face is ashen, but there’s something in her eyes, something desperate, something wild and vengeful. Something old and sad.

“Let’s go,” I say, standing up. I pick up the bottle and wait for her to stand.

It takes her a minute to move, to blink again. I pull her chair back and she rises. I take her arm and she doesn’t resist when I lead her toward the elevator. When the man stationed there sees us coming, he pushes the button and the doors slide open when we reach it.

Suddenly, I feel like I need to hide her away. Like I shouldn’t have had her out here, where everyone would see her. They’ll want to know who she is. They’ll look into who she is and I don’t want them to. I don’t want anyone to. I want to keep her hidden. Keep her to myself.

I don’t let her go until we’re in my office. The elevator doors close behind us and she walks toward my desk, drawn to the monitors there. There are six of them and currently, five are set on the club and one on the house. Helen is moving around the living room. Cilla watches her, cocks her head to the side as she does.

From the wet bar, I retrieve a wine glass and pour her one from the bottle I brought up. For myself, I pour a whiskey. She turns to look at me when I approach, takes the glass from my hand.

“You watch the house?”

I sip my drink and nod. I haven't thought about what it felt like to drive the knife into my uncle's belly for a long time, but I remember it. I remember breaking skin, cutting through fat.
