HOW TO USE THE MINI LEARNING CARDS

Learning cards are used in school to help reinforce basic skills. Now you can use them at home to help your child learn to read. All Pictureback Readers include this educator-endorsed teaching tool on the last page of the book. Just take a scissors and cut along the lines. You will then have a mini learning card to match every word in the book.* After your child is familiar with the story, here are some educational games you and your child can play. Or you may wish to invent games of your own.

Making Matches. Choose a mini learning card. Ask your child to go on a treasure hunt and find the same word in the story. Or print a word from the story on a piece of blank paper. Ask your child to hunt for the matching mini learning card.

Riddles. Make up riddles about some of the words in the story, such as, "It's round and it bounces. What is it?" Have your child find the word card for *ball*. Another kind of riddle uses rhyme: "I'm thinking of something that rhymes with... What's the word?" Your child would try to find the appropriate word in the pile of mini learning cards.

Building Sentences. Ask your child to pick a card and use it to begin a sentence. Then you and your child take turns adding words until you have a sentence. And here's a funny sentence building game. Begin by telling your child that your sentences keep getting mixed up. Ask him or her to help you unscramble the sentence you are trying to make.

The Baseball Game. You are the pitcher, your child is the batter, and the ball is a card you pick from the pile. The rules for strikes, hits, and so on are up to you. For example, if your child reads a difficult word card correctly, such as *dinosaur*, you can call it a home run.

Concentration. Make a set of hand-printed word cards to match the ones provided. Turn all the cards word-side down and take turns trying to uncover pairs, as you would in the popular card game Concentration.

Make a Wordbook. When your child knows all the words, you might want to help him or her make a "picture dictionary of words I know." Your child can paste his or her favorite words in a blank book (alphabetical order is optional) and draw or find a picture to illustrate each word.

*Keep the mini learning cards together by storing them in a plain business envelope. Then tape the envelope to this page, and you and your child will always know where to find the cards.
